

VISION



IPC GOALS




INTERNATIONAL EARLY YEARS CURRICULUM (IEYC)


INTERNATIONAL PRIMARY CURRICULUM (IPC)

Having that knowledge and being able to think about the application of the knowledge




LEARNING

Everest.

During the visit, students observed how waste is segregated, compressed, shredded, and recycled. They learned how coordinated efforts—from households to mountains—are necessary to reduce pollution and promote sustainable practices, gaining insight into the challenges and solutions involved.

The learners also took a pledge for the ‘Safa ra Sundar Nepal Abhiyan’, committing to small, practical actions such as reducing plastic use and encouraging recycling in their daily lives. The visit helped students see how systems, effort, and responsibility come together to tackle plastic pollution, and how their own actions can contribute to meaningful change.

KITE FLYING WITH GRADE 5



This Dashain, our Grade 5 learners at Sanskriti International School embraced a cherished tradition by flying kites on the school grounds. Kite flying during Dashain is more than a playful activity—it symbolizes freedom, hope, and the triumph of good over evil, connecting generations through shared cultural heritage.
